

THE ENLIGHTENER LENT / EASTER 2025



With the (perhaps temporary) thaw, the movement of our natural calendar comes the movement of the church calendar. Our annual journey through the life of Jesus now brings us to the most somber of

seasons, Lent. For these solemn forty days, we will journey with Christ, we will remember his time in the desert, his temptations, and his triumph. Most of all this journey will take us to a hill outside the city of Jerusalem. A hill on which the Law of God was fulfilled and the universe forever changed.

This is the time of year we give things up... giving up something that helps us improve our life, not just earn us a merit badge. As you think about your Lenten discipline, whether it's giving up something, taking on something, or just barely keeping your head above the water, the point isn't to heap on suffering, to wear hair-shirts and suffer publicly. It is instead to take time to deepen our faith, improve our relationship with God and with the world, and to enrich our own faith practice.

What that looks like is different for each of us, yet saying that is not an invitation to ignore the season. We exist in a society that prizes convenience and pleasure above all else. We all fall into the traps that are laid for us by the world, being lulled into a mindset that says fasting and penitence are unnecessary, even archaic and ridiculous practices of a bygone era. But that is not what scripture teaches us and it is not what the church calls us to. We shouldn't think of claiming a faith tradition as a long set of rules we must enforce on ourselves and others. It is an invitation into a way of life, a way that offers a rhythm to our existence, tools to better ourselves,

and ultimately a hope that nothing else in existence can provide.

Lent can be the invitation you need to start praying the daily office, maybe start reading a section of scripture you've wanted to get to, recite the psalms daily, pray the rosary, or any number of devotional acts. Maybe there is a book you want to read that will guide you through Lent or Holy Week, if you need recommendations I've got plenty! Basically, life is always full of distractions and ways to make ourselves busy. Lent can be the excuse you need to make space in your life for God.

During the season of Lent you will notice some changes occurring in our worship. We will use more of the prayerbook, such as the penitential order, and great litany. The 8:00 am and 10:00 am services will continue using Rite I and Rite II respectively. At the 10:00 am service we will begin chanting the 'sursum corda' - the opening lines of the eucharistic prayer (the lord be with you - and also with you. Etc.). The penitential order will only be during the season of Lent. I encourage you to offer thoughts and reflections on any of these changes to me as we continue to explore our rich liturgical traditions!

I invite you to a holy Lent. Take time in life to reconnect with your faith. These forty days will help cement new habits for you and guide you through your own wilderness. I am always available for conversations, pastoral care, or direction during your Lenten journey.

May God be with us all on this road to Golgotha.



We've chosen The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store by James McBride:

In 1972, when workers in Pottstown, Pennsylvania, were digging the foundations for a new development, the last thing they expected to find was a skeleton at the bottom of a well. Who the skeleton was and how it got there were two of the long-held secrets kept by the residents of Chicken Hill, the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and African Americans lived side by side and shared ambitions and sorrows. Chicken Hill was where Moshe and Chona Ludlow lived when Moshe integrated his theater and where Chona ran the Heaven & Earth Grocery Store. When the state came looking for a deaf boy to institutionalize him, it was Chona and Nate Timblin, the Black janitor at Moshe's theater and the unofficial leader of the Black community on Chicken Hill, who worked together to keep the boy safe.

HOLY WEEK

As we begin this season of Lent I want to talk a little bit about the end of the season - Holy Week. From the Procession of the Palms on Passion Sunday to proclamation of the resurrection at the Great Vigil on Saturday night, the liturgies of Holy Week slow down the gospel narrative and take us day by day into the days and hours leading up to the arrest and execution of Jesus. In the 1979 Book of Common Prayer, we are provided with many opportunities to connect with the oldest Christian observances and liturgies, especially as we enter the Paschal Triduum on Maundy Thursday.

The Triduum walks us from the Last Supper to the Resurrection and recountings of these liturgies go back to some of the earliest known records of Christian worship. It is important to note that from the opening lines of the Maundy Thursday service to the dismissal at the Great Vigil we are in one continuous service. There is no salutation or dismissal on Maundy Thursday or Good Friday. To emphasize this, we will have service booklets that cover the whole of the Triduum. The booklets should remain here at church and will contain all the services of those three days so that we can be in mind of its ongoing nature.

On Maundy Thursday we are drawn into the actions of Jesus - washing feet, establishing the eucharist, waiting in prayer for what is to come. The act of washing feet - as Jesus himself did - is a humbling and beautiful experience for all to understand both the love of God and the call of clergy to serve everyone. The term 'Maundy' comes from the Latin word 'Mandatus', which is where we get the modern word, "mandate". It signifies that at the Last Supper Jesus instituted the Eucharist, the most sacred repeatable sacrament the church has for our continual renewal and connection with the Kingdom of God. After the service the sanctuary is stripped of all adornment and it's almost as if the church is holding its breath, waiting as Christ did in the garden at Gethsamane for what is to come next - arrest and death.

Good Friday we recall Christ's death on the cross. A brutal execution by the powers and principalities of the world that God takes on to fulfill the Law and set us free from the power of death. Good Friday is the only day on the Western Christian calendar when no mass can be celebrated, no eucharist consecrated. There is no communion to be had. Some churches have communion from the 'reserve sacrament' which is specifically set aside on Maundy Thursday for that purpose. This year we will not do that, but instead focus our attention on the veneration of the cross. That rough, wooden method by which we are set free and assured an eternity in the Kingdom that is to come.

All is quiet as we leave the cross and wait in anticipation of what we know comes next. The Great Vigil of Easter, older than the other services of the Triduum, is the most important service of the entire year. It is the moment we move from darkness into light, from death into resurrection. Originally this service would begin an hour or two before dawn, and as the sunlight began to show forth the resurrection of Christ would be proclaimed. For the last few centuries, the Great Vigil has shifted for many of us to a Saturday night activity. Once the sun has set, we will light and bless the new fire, from which the Paschal Candle will be lit. From there we take the new light of Christ into the darkened nave and hear the story of salvation, the record of God's love and promises, leading up to when we turn all the lights on, light all the candles, and proclaim in a loud voice, "Alleluia! Christ is Risen!". It is my understanding that Christ Church Pittsford has not celebrated the Great Vigil of Easter for a very long time, if ever. I look forward to sharing one of my favorite services of the entire church year with you as we celebrate the end of Lent and the Feast of the Resurrection.

Holy Week, especially the Triduum, can be absolutely intense, exhausting, an emotional rollercoaster. That in many ways is the point. This brings to us a visceral experience of Christ's passion and death, and is so important for our faith journey to be reminded of everything that is a part of that. I hope you will make the time to journey with me through this sacred time.
